AUTISM AWARENESS TRAINING

Over the last few months, the Resource Center has been training Foster Parents and Case Managers in the Department of Family and Children Services region 12. We have trained over 60 DFCS Case Managers and over 100 Foster Parents and will be reaching more as we have 6 more trainings scheduled for both. Autism Awareness is the theme of the training and we have received positive feedback from both Foster Parents and Case Managers. As we finish our region, we will begin sharing our training with the other 13 regions in the state. Our "rollout" of trainings will begin in January 2023. We are excited to be able to share this important training across the state.


Our goal is to continue creating more training opportunities about working with children with Autism to Foster Parents and Case Managers beyond the grant funding timeline.

American Academy of Pediatrics CATCH Grant


Earlier this year the Resource Center was awarded The Community Access To Child Health (CATCH) program grant from the American Academy of Pediatrics. The grant was written to bring an awareness of Autism to the Department of Juvenile Justice throughout the state.

The presentation that will be delivered to probation officers should be completed by the end of 2022 and trainings beginning in 2023.

Our hope is that the trainings are useful to the DJJ and the program will continue beyond the life of the grant funding.
